403 wagon restored

AT the recent Easter Pageant in Canberra, Brian Jubb from Liverpool in NSW showed off his newly restored 403 wagon for the first time since he found it at Inverell in March 2005. It was last registered in 1992 and had been used by an apiarist for farm work and was straight but worn out.

Brian says that mice had made their home in the back seats and the smell was appalling. He spend three hours with a steam cleaner to get the smell out.

The car was stripped, then the interior painted. The bailey channel and rubbers were fitted, then the exterior was painted.

Brian has done a wonderful job on the 1960 wagon, which looks splendid in lustrous silver-grey paint.

The interior is upholstered in cloth sourced from Holden Special Vehicles and looks stunning. (Brian is a retired upholsterer.) Much of the plastic interior trim has been treated to a woodgrain finish. The reason for this is that some of the knobs and handles were badly worn, and others

are new, but black. The woodgrain effect is surprising, but not offensive.

Brian was able to source all the rubber components locally, although he has used ingenuity is some cases, such as the inner door-stop rubbers, which are from shock absorbers.

Probably the one important divergence from standard fittings is the choice of headlights, which are halogen units from a Mack truck. Why? "So I can see at night," says Brian.

The brakes, radiator and heater were renewed and the engine had new gaskets fitted. A burnt valve was repaired and the clutch replaced.

The mechanicals are all stock standard, and Brian says the car drives well. He had a little trouble getting to Canberra when one of the plug leads started shorting out on the accelerator cable, but he soon fixed the problem using duct tape.

From a line-up of 39 cars that included a 407 diesel coupe and two 504 cabriolets, Brian's wagon won the People's Choice award at the Easter Pageant.

Brian has restored several other cars, including an Austin A40 Farina and a Valiant two-door hardtop. He says he is amazed by the friendly reception he received at Canberra.
